Eddie Anguiano, known to the world as "Baby Moses," celebrated the 10th anniversary of his historic heart transplant surgery on November 20 at Loma Linda University Children's Hospital. He paved the way for almost 300 other children in Loma Linda, 203 of them under six months of age, to have their faulty hearts replaced with good ones. Born on November 16, 1985, Eddie is the oldest living survivor of infant heart transplantation. Without intervention he would have died within days. Eddie continues to make history every day of his life.
